

HOW DID YOU COME TO BE INVOLVED IN THIS

PROJECT? Our clients, Silvia and Paul Baker, found us online and reached out originally for Zulufish's architectural service. After viewing the townhouse with them in 2021, the project expanded into a full renovation and interior design package as our 360-degree approach really appealed. HOW INVOLVED WERE THE

HOMEOWNERS? They were very involved throughout and we had weekly meetings to update them on the planning, design and progress all the way through

to choosing materials and products. Many of our projects are a collaborative journey and clear communication from the outset is integral to our approach. WHAT WAS THEIR BRIEF?

With two children, Mia, 10, and Noah, 13, they wanted a multifaceted family home that would blend contemporary design with timeless elegance, offering versatile living spaces with a warm and welcoming ambience.

An open sense of flow with a seamless connection between the interior and exterior was very important. Their home also had to reflect their

passion for music and showcase their extensive vinyl collection.

HOW WAS THE LAYOUT CHANGED? A combination of smaller, cramped, dark rooms on the lower ground floor were knocked through and extended to create one cohesive, open-plan kitchen-diner and living room. The space now connects to the garden which features an outdoor kitchen, corner seating and dining area.

The garage and a series of awkward storage rooms at the front were also removed to allow more space for the guest suite, utility room and wine room.

FLEXIBILITY WITH LETTING LIGHT IN AND HAVING PRIVACY'

KITCHEN Mocha and graphite tones with black accents have a sophisticated luxe feel.

Addressing the lack of natural light and low, oppressive ceiling height, we dropped the floor to create a sense of grandeur.

HOW DID YOU CREATE FLOW AND COHESION

connection both vertically and horizontally between each floor was paramount, so we extended the central circular staircase so it would thread down to the new lower ground floor, creating flow throughout the core of the building.

WHAT WAS YOUR
INSPIRATION FOR THE
SCHEME? We introduced a

monochromatic palette across the ground floor that delivers an urban edge, but at the same time feels serene and calming. On the lower ground floor, textured metallics such as burnished brass, oxidised copper and bronze, along with microcement and timber, create an organic cocooning ambience that naturally leads to the garden.

WHAT WAS THE MOST SATISFYING ASPECT OF THIS PROJECT? Seeing this wonderful family space emerge from

a very dark and overlooked space.

Extensions can often feel exactly just

that, a separate 'extension', and yet this living area harmoniously blends into the existing framework of the house.

WHAT IS YOUR ADVICE

FOR CREATING A SUCCESSFUL SCHEME?

Exploring ways to maximise the flow of natural light is key to consider at the initial planning stages. Whether a period cottage or a contemporary apartment, harnessing natural light through thoughtful design can transform a home and significantly enhance its aesthetic and value. Sulufish.co.uk
